It's Shakespeare, But Not As We Know It!

In a complete departure from previous years, this year's Summer production is going to be Shakespeare, with a twist! We're delighted to welcome Gerard Bourke to the group for his production of Tom Stoppard's "Rosencrantz and Guildenstern Are Dead".

In Hamlet, every exit is an entrance to somewhere else – but where have non-entities Rosencrantz and Guildenstern been in-between their minor scenes in Shakespeare's best-known play? This is the puzzle Tom Stoppard teases out with all his characteristic wit and humour in his multi-award-winning comedy, "Rosencrantz and Guildenstern Are Dead".


Rosencrantz and Guildenstern are bewildered innocents, finding themselves in the wings at court, having been summonsed by the Queen and her sinister new husband. Worse, now their old friend Hamlet appears to have gone mad. They sense "something is rotten in the state of Denmark", but just what has that to do with them? All the main characters from Hamlet come on and go off, enacting

Shakespeare's original scenes with Rosencrantz and Guildenstern, but leaving behind the hapless pair as baffled as ever. It seems it may be an eternity before they'll discover their role in Shakespeare's plot. And as Guildenstern frets: "Eternity's a terrible thought. I mean, where's it all going to end?"

The play will be performed for four nights outdoors at Airfield Gardens, Dundrum, from 18th to 21st June 2011 (Midsummer's Night), followed by two nights at the Mill Theatre on 22nd and 23rd June 2011.

All members are encouraged to get involved either backstage or on-stage for this production, so to find out more, please come along to St Tiernan's Community School, Parkvale, Dundrum. on 4th and 6th April 2011 from 7.30pm to whenever the caretaker gets grumpy (generally around 9.30pm).

Jacqui was prompted to undertake the two marathon events, "The Great Ireland Run" in





Sandyford Little Theatre Company presents "An Inspector Calls" by J. 8. Priestley in the Mill from 12th to 16th April 2011.

Widely considered to be one of Priestley's best known works for the stage and one of the classics of mid-20th century English theatre, "An Inspector Calls", is the chilling tale of what can happen when we don't look out for each other—something that's all the more relevant now, in these difficult economic times, than ever.

Directed by acclaimed director Moira Walsh, this threeact drama takes place on a single night in 1912, and focuses on the prosperous middle-class Birling family who live in a comfortable home in Brumley, "an industrial city in the north Midlands". The family is visited by a man calling himself Inspector Goole, who questions them about the suicide of a young working-class woman, Eva Smith. Throughout the play we witness the gradual psychological breakdown of each of the characters as the Inspector conducts his interrogation of the family.

Long considered part of the repertory of classic "drawing room" theatre, the play has also been hailed as a scathing critique of the hypocrisies of Victorian/Edwardian English society and as an

expression of Priestley's Socialist political principles.

Our very own Oran O'Rua is "moonlighting" with Sandyford LTC for this production, playing the part of "Eric", the errant, alcoholic son whose parents who are blinded to his shortcomings by their social standing and moral apathy.
