

Cat On A Hot Tin Roof

Cat On A Hot Tin Roof is centred on 'Big Daddy' Pollitt's plantation. He is the richest cotton planter in the Mississippi Delta, and he is about to celebrate his sixty-fifth birthday. He is joined on the family estate by his eldest son Gooper and his family, his favoured younger son, Brick, an ageing football hero who has turned to drink, and Brick's feisty wife, Maggie. As the hot summer evening unfolds, the veneer of happy family life and Southern gentility gradually slips away as unpleasant truths emerge and greed, lies, jealousy and suppressed sexuality threaten to reach boiling point. Winner of the Pulitzer Prize for drama, Tennessee Williams' *Cat on a Hot Tin Roof* is a masterly portrayal of family tensions and individuals trapped in prisons of their own making.

Thomas Lanier 'Tennessee' Williams III, worked principally as a playwright in the American theatre. He also wrote short stories, novels, poetry, essays, screenplays and a volume of memoirs. His reputation was firmly established with his play *A Streetcar Named Desire*, in 1947. Other successes, which were also brought to the cinema included *The Glass Menagerie*, *Cat on a Hot Tin Roof* (1955) and *The Night of the Iguana*.

Oran O'Rua began acting and directing with UCD Dramsoc, where he was awarded the Irish Student Drama Association's Best Actor award in 1998. While in UCD Dramsoc, he adapted for the stage the Robbie Hyland poem, *What Has To Be Done*, and directed the ensuing production entitled, *Betrayal*. A member of Balally Players since 2003, he has played diverse roles both on and off-stage. In 2008, Oran directed a new piece of Irish writing entitled, *The Moon Cut Like A Sickle*, by Ken Armstrong, and has since gone on to direct and produce a number of one act and full-length plays. Throughout 2012, Oran was a participant on the Fishamble Theatre Director Programme based in the Mill Theatre. Most recently with Balally Players, he directed *The Glass Menagerie*, by Tennessee Williams, which was performed in the Mill Theatre.

He has appeared as Shylock in *The Merchant of Venice* with the Dublin Shakespeare Society. With Balally Players, Niall has appeared in *The Merry Wives of Windsor*, *As You Like It, Twelfth Night, Out of Order Minister* by Ray Cooney, and *All My Sons* by Arthur Miller.





Elaine Burgess

Elaine has performed on stage, radio and to camera in many productions. Theatre productions have included *Adult Child/Dead Child, Pieces of Me* and *Black Adder Bells*, where she played Kate. Her television and film work has spanned short films, commercial projects and over 30 productions as a background artist. She was recently awarded Distinction in the Irish Board of Speech and Drama 'Adult Acting' Drama Exam.

Barry O'Connor

Over many years Barry has acted with a number of groups including Dublin Youth Theatre, Club Players and Olivian Players. This is his third production with Balally Players, having played Philip Markham in *Move Over Mrs. Markham* and he also performed ttzin the Christmas Show at Marlay House.





Paul Sharpe

Paul has been involved in many plays, musicals and productions for radio, television and cinema over the years. As a director, he has won a number of accolades. His 'bucket list' of dream roles include Gypo Nolan in *The Informer*, The Bull McCabe in *The Field*, and King Arthur in *Camelot*.
